Below are some ideas and resources that will help you and your child have an eventful and enjoyable summer season.

STEP INTO STEM

A study conducted by researchers at the University of California Irvine found that early math skills were the most consistently predictive measure of future academic success among K-5 students.

Alongside strengthening their math skills, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) projects can help boost your child's developmental and communication skills. Summer STEM projects are a great way to keep your kids engaged and learning throughout the summer.

During the summer, you can get your children to use math and science in a new light by introducing hands-on STEM activities that encourage their sense of experimentation and problem solving.

EMBRACE THE ARTS

Encourage your child to express themselves creatively by documenting the summer through either a written journal or video. As your child watches different television shows and movies this summer, you can practice critical thinking skills afterwards. Launch conversation with the following prompts:

1. Summarize the movie in five sentences.
2. What surprised you about this movie? What did you find interesting?
3. What themes could you pick out?
4. Which character did you relate to the most and why?

Has your household watched *The Chosen* yet? This multi-season series introduces the life of Jesus and the Gospels in a way that's entertaining and accessible for children and families. After watching an episode, take a few minutes for group sharing.
